

### What is Title VI?

The Title VI grant is funded to provide a "unique and culturally related" educational experience while ensuring that "Indian students gain knowledge and understanding of Native communities, languages, Tribal histories, traditions, and cultures" and that school leaders and staff who serve Indian students are able to provide them "culturally appropriate and effective instruction".

Aligning with the CTUIR Education Department mission and goals, Title VI focuses on learning literacy (pinášukwat) by connecting the students with their ancestral past through methods that are based in Tribal traditions

The Youth Services team strives to provide the support our students need to succeed by making sure they and families are connected to necessary resources, receiving academic assistance, and are participating in Indigenous Ways of Knowing, with the goal of increasing graduation rates and preparing students for economic sovereignty.



### Does Your Student Qualify?

If your student, yourself, or a grandparent is an enrolled member of a Federally Recognized Tribe or Band or if your student is a descendant of a parent or grandparent who meets these requirements, your student qualifies.

A 506 form needs to be completely filled out and returned to your respective Indian Education Coordinator, the school's front desk, or the Title VI Youth Services Manager. Use the QR code below to access a fillable 506 form:


The reason why I have chosen Oliver is because he always has a smile on his face and positive things to say to his classmates. I have seen him help others when needed.

### Introduction of Title VI New Hire

Micah Reading has changed positions from a teacher at Nixyaawii Community School to Indian Ed ccordinator. Mr Reading has taught multiple subjects, led culturall trips to Olympic and Ranier national parks, led ski trips to Bluewood ski resort, and is still the jumps coach for the track team which produced the schools first ever track and field state champion in the high jump. He brings a unique skill set to the new position by connecting and assisting native students in their academics through tutoring and using a variety of education resources to keep students on track to graduate. He was last years graduating class of 2024 keynote speaker and has made a positive impact on the youth during his time as a teacher which will translate well into his new position.







One of the ways Mr Reading assisted in academics was teaching the GED program. He taught a period during school as a class and worked summer school teaching GED studies the last 3 years. Students who fall behind are not on track to graduate and are placed in GED studies. If the student earns a GED they are given 9 credits toward their diploma and may be back on track to graduate. He has assisted several successful students in earning their GED and some went on to earn their diploma.



### Native Wellness Institute Speaks to Pendleton School District



### Thank you to the Pendleton School District

PSD recently received the TAPP (Tribal Attendance Promising Practices) grant that which allowed a second TAPP coordinator to be hired at Sunridge Middle School, Raymond Fox. This was featured in last month's newsletter. In addition to this new hire, Pendleton School District decided to use some of this grant money on, among other things, an opportunity for cultural inclusion.

Native Wellness Institute met with several Pendleton SD teachers and staff at the Pendleton Early Learning Center on March 7<sup>th.</sup> Trainers Wade McGee (Cherokee) and Tomas Amaya (A:shiwi/Rarámuri/Yoeme) talked about how important it is for teachers to be seen in their Native student's community. Students are more receptive, and teachers are more impactful when they are open to learning about their AI/AN students and have a better understanding of where they come from.

Title VI Coordinator, Cara Greene, openly shared that students learn basic academic skills like math in the longhouse kitchen and through other cultural experiences. Others shared that staff are welcome to join in on most cultural events and that it is encouraged so they can view their students through the lens of their community and culture.

Ai/An students represent 11%-23% of Pendleton School District's student body.

WORKING TOWARDS DEEPER INCLUSION

Ideas were expressed for how PSD can be more involved. Those ideas included providing students an opportunity to help construct a teepee, cooking classes which include First Foods, smudging at school, and others. There are also conversations happening surrounding credits for cultural activities.

Overall, the information was well received by PSD teachers and staff, they asked a lot of questions and were well engaged.
