Updating Current UIR COVID-19 GUIDELINES

The following guidelines are tentative and have not yet been issued.

- <u>Capacity limitations</u> will rise from 50% to 75% for indoors. This applies to restaurants and the senior center, faith institutions, funerals, weddings, and cultural ceremonies, recreation and fitness establishments, and retail facilities and the casino. Faith institutions, funerals, weddings, and cultural ceremonies will be limited to 300 people maximum for outdoor events.
- <u>Social and at-home gatherings</u> for indoors will be limited to a maximum of 10 individuals with a recommendation that no more than four households gather. Outdoors will be limited to a maximum of 25 individuals.
- <u>Mask use</u> indoors will continue unchanged and will be required in all CTUIR entities while walking through open spaces and interacting with others. Childcare facilities will follow ODE guidance. Faith institutions will have the ability to determine their own masking policies for fully vaccinated individuals. Mask use will no longer be required for people who are outdoors, though masking is still encouraged, especially in crowded places and for people who are not vaccinated.
- Education, daycare, and summer programs will continue to follow ODE or guidelines by OHA.

Covid-19 Breakthrough Cases

- YTHC reported its first breakthrough COVID cases this week
 - 3 total breakthrough cases
- Defining a vaccine breakthrough infection
 - A breakthrough infection is defined as a positive COVID-19 test from a person 14 or more days after they have completed all recommended doses of the COVID-19 vaccine.

Covid-19 Breakthrough Cases

- Vaccine breakthrough cases occur in only a small percentage of vaccinated people.
- Vaccine breakthrough cases are expected. COVID-19 vaccines are effective and are a critical tool to bring the pandemic under control. However, no vaccines are 100% effective at preventing illness in vaccinated people. There will be a small percentage of fully vaccinated people who still get sick, are hospitalized, or die from COVID-19.
- More than 139 million people in the United States have been fully vaccinated as of June 7, 2021. Like with other vaccines, vaccine breakthrough cases will occur, even though the vaccines are working as expected. Asymptomatic infections among vaccinated people will also occur.
- There is some evidence that vaccination may make illness less severe for those who are vaccinated and still get sick.
- Current data suggest that COVID-19 vaccines authorized for use in the United States offer protection against most SARS-CoV-2 <u>variants</u> currently circulating in the United States. However, variants will cause some vaccine breakthrough cases.
