

Vaccine Plan

COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

CTUIR VACCINATION DISTRIBUTION PLAN

Yellowhawk is expecting to receive its first shipment of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine that has been approved for emergency use. The vaccine will not be provided to everyone at once. The CTUIR Incident Command Team has approved the following prioritization plan for vaccine distribution.

Yellowhawk is directly contacting those eligible to determine their interest in receiving a COVID-19 vaccine.

PHASE 1

- Yellowhawk staff
- CTUIR first responders
- Patients* 75 years and older

PHASE 1B

 Patients 65 years and older with underlying health conditions

PHASE 2



PHASE 2A

- CTUIR essential staff** that regularly interact with the public.
- Patients 55 years and older with underlying health conditions

PHASE 2B

 Patients of all ages with underlying health conditions

PHASE 3



PHASE 3

- Healthy adults and children
- All remaining individuals

*Patients include all Yellowhawk eligible patients, including CTUIR Tribal Members. **Essential worker as defined by the US Department of Homeland Security

The phased plan is subject to change based on future distribution allocations.



Vaccination Events

- Two day event in February (23rd & 24th)
 - Assisted by the Oregon National Guard
 - CTUIR employees & immediate family members, vendors, contractors, and UIR residents
 - 978 doses given none wasted
- Second dose clinic in March
 - March 16 and 17
- Vaccination event for area high school students
 - Afternoon of March 17

Tribes report successes in COVID-19 vaccine

rollout Yet another tribe getting recognition is the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation. Matt Johnson, interim deputy executive director for the tribe, says that as of early March, he believes 694 out of 3,100 tribal members have been needled in the arm.

"We have also vaccinated 443 non-CTUIR member Indians through Yellowhawk (Tribal Health Center)," he adds. In addition, the tribe offered a mass vaccination clinic for non-Indians living on the reservation, which resulted in 840 people getting their first of two shots.

"When all is said and done, after this last group from the mass vaccination receives their booster shot in a couple of weeks, the tribe will have fully vaccinated over 2,100 individuals who are either tribal members, CTUIR non-Indian staff, non-CTUIR member Indians, or non-Indian residents of the reservation and surrounding community," Johnson says.

Vaccination Statistics

- 2,063 vaccine doses administered
 - 1,053 to AI/AN community
 - 656 went to CTUIR members
- Adequate supply on hand
 - 40 vials that will expire at the end of March
 - 15 vials that will expire at the end of April
 - Each vial contains multiple doses
 - Additional 975 doses for the second dose of the mass vaccination event
 - Loaned Lummi 12 vials, after Lummi held a mass vaccination event and miscounted their doses
 - Lummi will be returning the vials when they receive their next shipment

Updated CTUIR Restrictions

- CTUIR restrictions were updated to conform with Oregon's high risk metrics effective February 26, 2021
 - Encouraging testing data followed by successful vaccination distributions on the Umatilla Indian Reservation has allowed for an ease of restrictions
 - Risk of C19 remains and mitigating measures such as personal hygiene, mask wearing, and social distancing remain
 - Notably the 75 mile travel restriction has been lifted, restaurants can resume indoor dining with capacity limitations, faith institutions can resume with capacity limitations, and indoor visitation is allowed for long term care facilities

CURRENT STANDARDS ON UMATILLA INDIAN RESERVATION CTUIR PLAN FOR COVID-19 RECOVERY





COVID-19 restrictions on the Umatilla Indian Reservation effective as of 4:00 p.m., Friday, February 26, 2021. This decision is based on encouraging testing data followed by successful vaccination distributions on the Umatilla Indian Reservation.

While the new restrictions allow for more flexibility, the risk of COVID-19 is not gone. You are strongly encouraged to remain attentive to personal hygiene, wearing of a mask and social distancing measures as well as getting tested when necessary and completing your COVID-19 vaccination series if you have not already done so.

TRAVEL

The 75 mile travel restriction is lifted.

- Employees who have not been vaccinated will be asked to take Binax testing after travel.
- If you have been vaccinated quarantine is not required.

RESTAURANTS

Gathering sizes will align with Oregon's framework for "High Risk" limits which are the same as Umatilla County:

- . Indoor capacity: Not to exceed 25% maximum occupancy or 50 people, whichever is smaller.
- Outdoor capacity: 75 people maximum.
- · Indoor AND Outdoor seating: 6 people per party and per table maximum, limit 2 households

FAITH INSTITUTIONS

Longhouse and churches can now go back to regular services with the following restrictions:

- Indoor Capacity: Maximum 25% occupancy or 150 people total
- Outdoor Capacity: 200 people maximum
- Funerals must comply with maximum capacity limits for faith institutions

EDUCATION

Watch for updates regarding daycare and education in mid-March.

INDOOR & ENTERTAINMENT ESTABLISHMENTS


